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Our Distinguished Faculty

Michael Patrick Carroll, Assemblyman (R), is an attorney in private practice as well as an assemblyman for the state of New Jersey Legislature. He received his B.A. degree in history and political science from Johns Hopkins University and his J.D. degree from Rutgers University School of Law. His legislative service includes the General Assembly from 1996 to the present, parliamentarian from 2002 to the present, and he serves on the Judiciary and the State Government Committees.

John J. Nationally acclaimed for her teaching, Ms. Franzese is the seven-time recipient of the Student Bar Association's Professor of the Year Award. Nominated for the Robert Foster Cherry Prize for Great Teaching, she has been named Exemplary Teacher by the American Association of Higher Education and was ranked the Top Law Professor in New Jersey by the New Jersey Law Journal.

Mindy Thompson Fullilove, M.D., is a research psychiatrist at New York State Psychiatric Institute and a professor of clinical psychiatry and public health at Columbia University. She was educated at Bryn Mawr College and Columbia University. Dr. Fullilove is a board certified psychiatrist, having received her training at New York Hospital-Westchester Division and Montefiore Hospital. After several years of work as a community psychiatrist, Dr. Fullilove co-founded NYC RECOVERS, an alliance of organizations concerned with the social and emotional recovery of New York City in the aftermath of Sept. 11. This project provided the data for her book, Root Shock: How Tearing Up City Neighborhoods Hurts America and What We Can Do About It, June 2004, Ballantine Books.

Rachel D. Godsil, Esq., teaches equality under American law, and property, zoning and land use policy at Seton Hall University School of Law. Prof. Godsil has been involved in environmental justice law and policy, and has recently been working with attorneys representing the South Camden Citizens in Action. She has written extensively on the convergence of race, poverty and the environment.
